If you had been a male slave at Oplontis . . .


You might have been cooking, cleaning, laundry, guarding, accounting, gardening, construction—slaves did it all. Slaves were considered part of the household and had to obey the master of the house. Slaves could be well-treated or poorly treated—it all depended on the owner. Slaves were property.

- You are owned by Lucius Crassius Tertius, the man who archaeologists believe was involved in the wine business at Oplontis B.
- Unlike some of the other slaves who help with accounting, you are not very welleducated. Your job today is to rinse out these wine containers called *amphorae*. Use pine pitch to seal up any cracks!

 You are one slave of many who work for Lucius Crassius Tertius. The vilicus is a slave who oversees your day-to-day work. You still have to follow their instructions, just as you would listen to your owner.
